## 1 Introduction

### **1.1** Overview of Local Plan review

- 1.1.1 Crawley Borough Council (hereafter referred to as the Council) is currently reviewing its adopted Local Plan Crawley 2030<sup>1</sup>. The emerging Local Plan was submitted to the Secretary of State for independent examination on 31 July 2023. The Examination Hearings took place in November 2023 (Phase 1 Hearings) and January 2024 (Phase 2 Hearings). Following these hearings the Council received post hearing advice from the Inspectors which set out initial preliminary findings on a number of strategic soundness matters and provided recommendations for modification of the emerging Local Plan.
- 1.1.2 Lepus Consulting has prepared this report on behalf of the Council to inform the Habitats Regulations Assessment (HRA) of the emerging Local Plan at the Main Modification stage<sup>2</sup>. This report supplements the Submission Publication Consultation HRA Report which was prepared by Lepus Consulting in January 2023<sup>3</sup>.
- 1.1.3 This report focuses on whether the modifications to the emerging Local Plan will result in new Likely Significant Effects (LSEs) upon any habitats site, and whether the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report remain valid in light of these modifications. In the context of this report, habitats sites include Special Areas of Conservation (SAC), Special Protection Areas (SPA) and Ramsar sites<sup>4</sup>.
- 1.1.4 This report solely focuses upon modifications to the plan made since the Examination hearings; it does not re-assess any aspect of the Submission Publication Consultation plan.
- 1.1.5 This report does not contain all information normally presented in an HRA report and should therefore be read in conjunction with the January 2023 Submission Publication Consultation HRA report.
- 1.1.6 This HRA has been prepared in accordance with the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 (as amended)<sup>5</sup>, known as the Habitats Regulations and has been informed by Planning Practice Guidance<sup>6</sup>.

# 2 Summary of HRA findings

### 2.1 Summary of HRA work

- 2.1.1 The following HRA reports have been prepared to help inform the preparation of the emerging Local Plan:
  - Adopted Local Plan HRA: Habitats Regulations Assessment Screening Report for the Crawley Borough Local Plan Review (Crawley Borough Council, November 2013).
  - Local Plan review: Habitats Regulations Assessment Screening Report for the Crawley Borough Local Plan Review (Crawley Borough Council, July 2019); and
  - Local Plan Review: Habitats Regulations Assessment Screening Report for the Crawley Borough Local Plan Review (Crawley Borough Council, January 2020).
  - Local Plan Additional Publication (Submission) consultation. Habitats Regulations Assessment of the Crawley Borough Council Local Plan. Draft. Report to Inform the HRA. (Lepus Consulting, January 2021).
  - Habitats Regulations Assessment of the Crawley Borough Council Local Plan.
     Submission Publication Consultation. Habitats Regulations Assessment Report (Lepus Consulting, January 2023).
- 2.1.2 Table 2.1 provides a summary of the HRA work that was undertaken to support the plan making process.

Summary of findings
At Regulation 18, as part of the current Local Plan review, an HRA Screening Report was undertaken to support the emerging draft version of the Plan. This report adopted the same study area as the HRA that was undertaken in support of the Adopted Local Plan, focusing on the same habitat sites and potential impact pathways. This was due to the similarities between the adopted and emerging plan review.
LSEs associated with recreational impacts at Mole Valley to Reigate SAC and Ashdown Forest SAC and SPA and hydrology impacts at South West London Waterbodies SPA and Mole Valley to Reigate SAC were screened out on the basis of the rationale set out for the Adopted Local Plan HRA.
In terms of air quality LSEs at Ashdown Forest SPA and SAC, the Screening Report indicates that there is a need to undertake further investigation to fully understand possible impacts on the habitat sites from the Local Plan review both on its own and in combination with other plans. This is following the Wealden Judgement in respect of in-combination effects, and in light of joint working that has since been undertaken in the Ashdown Forest Authority area through the Ashdown Forest Working Group.
An HRA Screening Report update was undertaken in January 2020 in support of the previous round Regulation 19 consultation. This drew on the same study area and assessed the same range of LSEs as the Regulation 18 version of the HRA. LSEs associated with recreational impacts at Mole Valley to Reigate SAC and Ashdown Forest SAC and SPA and hydrology impacts at South West London Waterbodies SPA and Mole Valley to Reigate SAC were screened out on the basis of the rationale set out for the Adopted Local Plan HRA.

# 3 Screening of Modifications

### 3.1 Introduction

- 3.1.1 This HRA report is part of a sequence of assessment phases which began in 2019 (see Table 2.1). It focuses on changes prepared by the Council which have been made in response to the findings issued by the planning inspector conducting the Local Plan examination hearings held in November 2023 and January 2024. Unless otherwise stated, all assessment findings reported in the 2023 HRA (Submission Publication Consultation) remain the same (as summarised in Table 2.1).
- 3.1.2 The HRA process has engaged with the following habitats sites:
  - Arun Valley SAC
  - Arun Valley SPA
  - Arun Valley Ramsar
  - Ashdown Forest SAC
  - Ashdown Forest SPA
  - Mole Gap to Reigate Escarpment SAC
  - The Mens SAC
- 3.1.3 Following the HRA methodology set out in Chapters 2 and 3 of the 2023 HRA report, modifications were reviewed to check whether there were any implications for the findings of the 2023 HRA and screened for new LSEs on the above habitat sites (Stage 1 of the HRA process).

### 3.2 Overview of main modification

- 3.2.1 The Main Modifications comprise three parts as follows:
  - The Main Modifications Schedule these are modifications which form part of the Inspectors' determination into the soundness of the emerging Local Plan.
  - The Local Plan Map Schedule these are changes to the emerging Local Plan Map identified by the Inspectors.
  - The Additional Modifications Schedule these are the additional (minor) modifications being proposed by the Council for the purposes of clarity and factual correctness. These will be published alongside the Main Modifications consultation, for the sake of completeness, but do not form part of the Main Modifications consultation.

### 3.3 Screening conclusions

3.3.1 The results of the Main Modifications screening exercise are presented in Appendix A. The right-hand column identifies whether there are any LSEs which may trigger a change to the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report.

- 3.3.2 The majority of modifications relate to clarification of points, correction of errors or addition of explanatory text. Other changes relate to amendments to policy wording which would trigger no new development or any other change likely to have an effect on a habitat site. Such modifications were found to have no new LSE on any habitats site, either alone or in-combination with other plans or projects, and therefore not change the findings of the 2023 HRA report.




Figure 3.1: Additional housing sites

- 3.3.3 The main modifications have clarified the plan period as 1 April 2023, rather than 2024. This is to ensure alignment with the submitted evidence base. This has resulted in amendments to the housing land trajectory and required corresponding policy wording updates. As a result, a number of additional consented sites, or those at an advanced stage in the planning process, have been included within the amended plan period. These are as listed below and illustrated on Figure 3.1.
  - 8-9 Queens Square (ref CR/2017/0552/FUL) (7 dwellings)
  - Steers Lane Phase 1 (ref R/2018/0894/OUT & CR/2020/0548/ARM) (185 dwellings – 150 anticipated during Local Plan period)
  - Forge Wood Phase 1B (CR/2015/0552/NCC & CR/2014/0061/ARM) (43 dwellings)
  - Land S/O & R/O 24 Brighton Road (CR/2014/0865/FUL) (14 dwellings)
  - 42-44 Brighton Road (CR/2020/0588/OUT & CR/2021/0308/ARM) (44 dwellings)
  - Belgrave House (CR/2020/0646/PA3 & CR/2018/0188/FUL) (41 dwellings)
- 3.3.4 These sites were included in the transport and water neutrality modelling which informed the 2023 HRA work. As such, their inclusion will not trigger any LSEs or lead to any change to the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report.
- 3.3.5 The clarification of the plan period has also resulted in a change to the employment land trajectory. The original transport and water neutrality modelling work tested up to 77,500sqm floorspace at Gatwick Green. The main modifications have removed 'The Base, Fleming Way' and as such required subsequent modifications to minimum residual employment land requirements that need to be met by newly allocated land and associated modifications to employment policy wording. Whilst the overall need figure for Gatwick Green has increased to 62,737sqm, this is still below the 77,500sqm figure originally tested in the transport and water neutrality modelling work. This is because the transport modelling was based on permutations of floorspace figures depending on the transport intensity of end-users. As such it can be concluded that there will be no new LSE or any change to the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report.
- 3.3.6 The main modifications strengthen policy wording around water neutrality making Policy SDC4 strategic. This strengthens requirements in this respect and will not lead to a new LSE or any change to the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report.
- 3.3.7 The main modifications do not lead to the allocation of new Gypsy, Traveller or Travelling Showpeople pitches and therefore will not result in a new LSE or any change to the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report.

3.3.8 In summary, it can be concluded that there will be no new LSEs from any main modification made since the Examination, and therefore no change to the findings of the 2023 HRA report.

# 4 Conclusions

### 4.1 Summary

4.1.1 This report assesses whether modifications to the emerging Local Plan will result in new Likely Significant Effects (LSEs) upon any habitats site, and whether the conclusions of the 2023 HRA report remain valid in light of these modifications. This assessment has indicated that there will be no new LSEs as a result of the proposed modifications. It can therefore be concluded that the main modifications will not change the findings of the 2023 HRA report and will not have an adverse impact on site integrity at any habitat site alone or in-combination.
